# Animal house to move Cricket club eyes

SAD DAYS: IT'S THE END OF AN ERA AS THE RSPCA SHUTS ITS FAIRFIELD SHELTER AND SHIFTS TO WACOL

HUNDREDS of cuddly creatures will be transported on a steamtrain to the RSPCA'S new Wacol shelter this Sunday as part of their relocation from Fairfield.

RSPCA spokesman Michael Beatty said the Fairfield shelter closed yesterday and would reopen at the Wacol premises on Tuesday

"About 300 animals will be involved in the move and that includes wildlife," Mr Beatty said.

"We are hoping to find a home for a few more animals before the move though.'

Mr Beatty said the relocation would mark the end of an era for the Fairfield shelter, which has been open since 1920.

"I think it's quite sad in a way," he said.

"It's a fairly nostalgic time for the staff and volunteers." Goats, rodents and guinea

pigs would be part of the animal contingency travelling on the train to Wacol, Mr Beatty said.

"Everyone here is looking forward to a new beginning at Wacol, including the animals," he said.

"There will be an animal care campus, an education barn, a cafe and dedicated wildlife hospital too.

"We are actually moving closer to one of Queensland's fastest-growing areas," he said.

SOUTHS Junior Cricket Club president Gary Asmussen remains confident the club will succeed in its quest to acquire a floodprone section of RSPCA Queensland's soon-to-be-abandoned Fairfield headquarters.

The club earlier this year petitioned Brisbane City Council to use a section of the adjoining RSPCA site - to be vacated this month when the organisation shifts to Wacol - to extend its junior playing field.

Mr Asmussen said he had since met with State Member for Yeerongpilly Simon Finn, with State Government representatives to hold a meeting this month to decide the land's future.

"Pending the outcome of that meeting, if the State Government decides to grant us some of the land they will hand that over to Council and Council will be the administrators. Simon was very confident we would get there," Mr Asmussen said. The remainder of the land

was likely to attract commercial interest.
