# Poll strain on parkland plan

THE Howard Smith Wharves project has been a political hot potato in the inner city for several years now

The main objection surrounded council's plans to build a boutique hotel on the site.

The remainder was to be revamped to create public parkland. Earlier this year, the State Government stepped in to can the project after January's floods inundated the site.

Eighteen months ago, the Central Ward had \$500,000 removed from its parks fund to bankroll the parkland for the project and residents are now rightly asking for their money back.

The park is at least two years away but council wants to hang on to the cash when it could be put to good use in parks being used by inner city residents, workers and visitors every day of the week.
